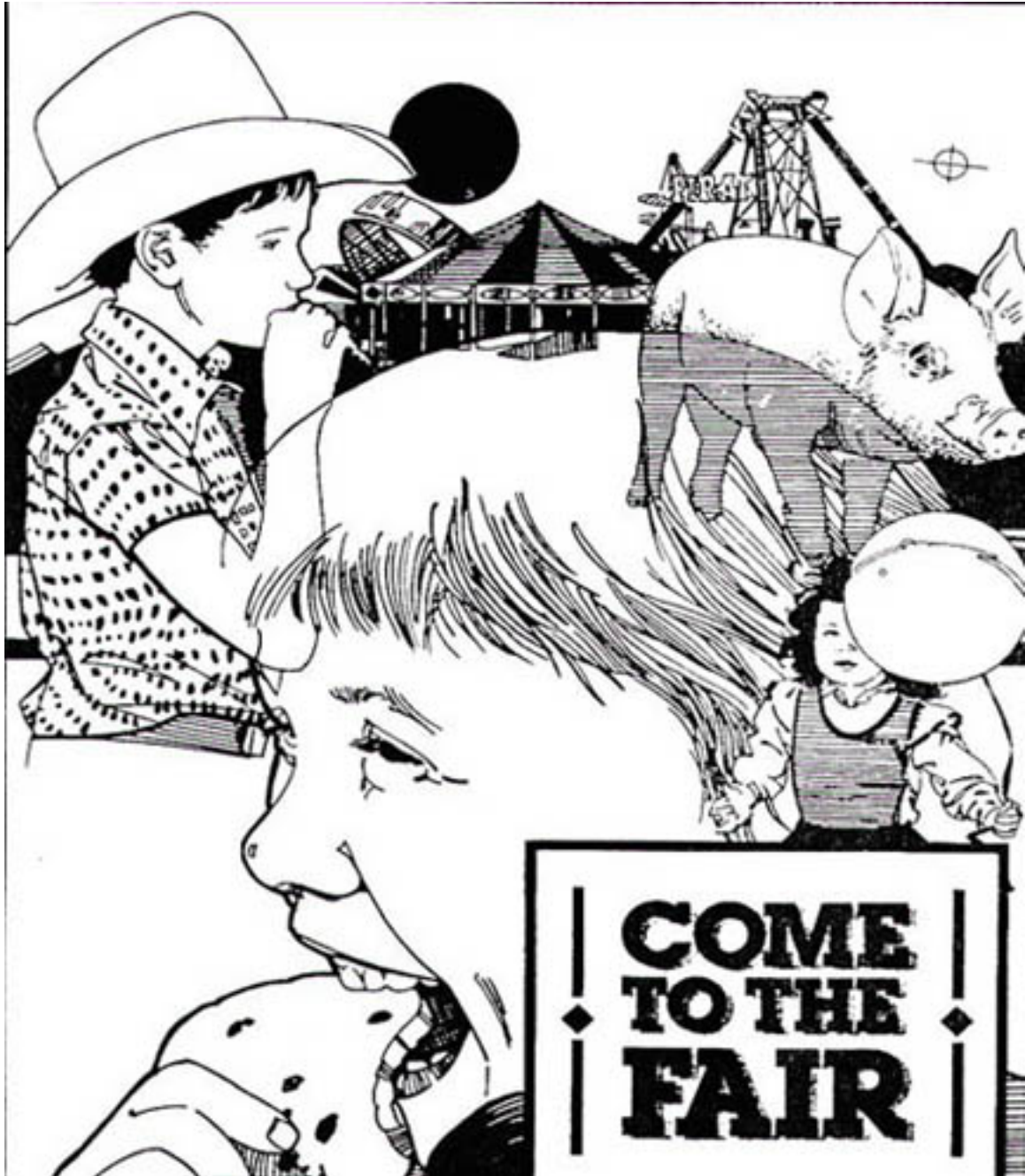

DIRECTIONS

We are located at 310 Leicester St. (Rt. 36) in Caledonia NY. We're almost at the corner of State Rt. 36 and State Rt. 5. Maps are available on our website <http://www.livingstoncountyfair.org/>

Although the thruway to Le Roy (exit 47) takes you a little out of the way it is probably the easiest exit to get you off at. When you get off in Le Roy you take Rt. 19 (Lake Street Rd.) to the light at Main St. (Rt. 5) in Le Roy and turn left. Continue on Rt. 5 to Caledonia and turn right on Rt. 36 across from the Town & Country Restaurant (and gas station on corner) and go about 10 feet to the fairgrounds.

If you wanted to get off the thruway (exit 46) in Rochester, you could get on 390 South to East Avon (exit 10), turn right onto Rt. 5 & 20 towards Avon and stay on that route through Avon until you get to the monument in Caledonia. Go around the monument to the left onto Rt. 5, go past the fire department and then turn left onto Rt. 36 across from the Town and Country Restaurant (gas station on the corner).

**Part 350
STANDARDS FOR CONDUCT OF FAIRS**

Section

- 350.1** Entry fee maximums
- 350.2** No fee for 4H, F.F.A., Junior Fair, or School Department Exhibits
- 350.3** Prompt, full payment of premiums
- 350.4** No premium for unworthy exhibit
- 350.5** Premium amount to attract well-balanced exhibits

- 350.8** Re-exhibition in Domestic Department

Section 350.1 Entry fees maximums. Entry fees shall not exceed ten (10) percent of first premium, except in poultry departments, where the fees shall not exceed 25 percent of first premium. However, a flat charge of \$2 per entry may be made in the cattle department in lieu of the ten (10) percent of the first premium. Any deviation from this standard must receive the approval of the commissioner.

Section 350.2 No fee for 4H, F.F.A., Junior Fair, or School Department Exhibits. No entry fee shall be charged for 4H Club, F.F.A. and Junior Fair exhibits entered for competition in their own classes, or for entries in the School Departments.

Section 350.3 Prompt, full payment of premiums. All premiums advertised and awarded must be paid promptly and in full, without deduction in the guise of donations or otherwise, notwithstanding any statement to the contrary or in modification thereof announced or stated in the premium book.

Section 350.4 No premiums for unworthy exhibit. No premium should be awarded by any judge or paid by any society for an unworthy exhibit.

Section 350.5 Premium amount to attract well-balanced exhibits. The amount of premium offered in the various departments should be such as to secure well-balanced exhibits, in the light of the types of agriculture carried on in the territory served by the Fair.

Section 350.6 No exhibits by judges in departments they oversee. No judge shall be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for premiums in the department with which they are connected.

Section 350.7 Exhibits to be plainly labeled. All exhibits must be plainly labeled so that the full significance of the exhibits will be made clear.

Section 350.8 Re-exhibition in Domestic Department. No article shall be permitted to be exhibited in the Domestic Department if it has been previously exhibited therein, unless by official action of the Board of Directors of any Fair Society, an exception is made to this requirement.

Section 350.9 Exhibits in the name of bona-fide owner; ownership of horses entered in 4-H horse shows of exhibition; poultry, sheep, swine limits.

- a. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona-fide owner.

- b. **Ownership of all exhibits must have existed for at least thirty (30) days previous to the time of showing, unless exhibited by the original producer or fabricator of the article exhibited.**
- c. **Proof of ownership of all exhibits must be presented by the exhibitor on request of the Fair Society.**
- d. **In the case of horses entered in 4-H horse shows or exhibitions the animal may be owned by the exhibitor or his immediate family.**
- e. **In such departments as poultry, sheep and swine, the number of breeds that an exhibitor or family shows may be limited to the number of breeds to be determined by official action at a meeting of the Board of Directors of any Fair Society.**

Section 350.10 Rejection or refusal of an exhibit. Any Fair Society shall reserve the right to reject or refuse and to order the removal of any exhibit which, in the opinion of its Board of Directors, is not eligible or worthy of showing or has not met the livestock health requirements.

Section 350.11 Compliance with and enforcement of livestock health requirements. Each fair or exhibition which receives money from the state pursuant to Article 24 of the Agriculture and Markets Law shall comply with and enforce the livestock health requirements set forth in Part 351 hereof.

**Animal Health Requirements For
Admission to New York State and County Fairs
(Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and Markets Regulations)**

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- **No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.**
- **No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian or an authorized agent.**
- **Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.**
- **Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.**

Note: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, deer, monkeys, misc. ruminants, camels and elephants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by an accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be uniquely identified. All manmade ID must be recorded. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI 61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI.
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

Out of State Origin Livestock:

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of issuance. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

- Animals requiring a CVI must be uniquely identified. Acceptable forms of unique identification include official eartag, registration tattoo, electronic identification or a sketch or photograph signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian who has inspected the individual animal.
 - An eartag with a handwritten or printed number that is not unique is not acceptable.
 - If electronic ID is utilized as the sole form of identification, the exhibitor is responsible for supplying a working electronic reader. If electronic ID cannot be read entry will be denied.
 - Acceptable identification allows positive matching of the animal to all accompanying documents including papers with laboratory test results and vaccination statements.

- **Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars and other markers.**
- **Llama and alpaca drawings must positively identify the individual animal.**
- **A name or a statement of color without additional distinguishing features or man made identification is not acceptable identification.**
- **USDA approved scrapie identification is required for all sheep and goats. See the sheep and goat sections below for more specific information.**

Rabies Vaccination

- **Current rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 105 days or older on the date of admission to the fair.**
- **An animal is currently vaccinated beginning 14 days following primary (initial) vaccination continuing for the period stated in the manufacturer's instructions.**
- **Rabies vaccine label instructions allow vaccination as early as 84 days of age. This allows a one week window between 84 and 91 days of age (105 minus 14 days) where vaccine can be administered to meet the 105 day requirement.**
- **If an animal reaches the minimum age for rabies vaccination during the fair season, the vaccination requirement must be met even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.**
- **Note: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be currently vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors.**

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- **Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the attending veterinarian or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the attending veterinarian.**
- **Acceptable proof of vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.**
- **If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.**
- **NOTE: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.**
- **Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.**

BVD-PI Testing

All cattle exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). Also, starting in 2009, all llamas, alpacas, guanacos and vicunas (new world camelids) must be test negative for BVD-PI. This is a once in a lifetime test

that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Cattle Testing:

- **Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle less than 61 days old:**
 - **Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)**
 - **whole blood virus isolation**
 - **whole blood PCR**
- **Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle 61 days of age and older:**
 - **Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)**
 - **Serum or milk Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)**
 - **Whole blood virus isolation**
 - **Whole blood, serum or plasma PCR**

Note: The Animal Health Diagnostic Center at Cornell University can conduct testing on pools of up to 10 cattle.

Llama, Alpaca, Guanaco, Vicuna Testing

- **Currently Acceptable BVD tests:**
 - **PCR**
 - **Whole blood virus isolation**

Note: The Animal Health Diagnostic Center at Cornell University can pool llama, etc. samples for PCR testing as follows: Animals less than 61 days of age can be tested in pools of 2 animals, whole blood only. Animals 61 days of age and older can be tested in pools of 5 animals using whole blood, serum or plasma.

Cleaning and Disinfection

- **All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).**

Kidding and Lambing

- **Due to the concern about the spread of scrapie, any sheep or goats that are exhibited at a county fair that have recently given birth or have a vaginal discharge, will be ordered removed along with their offspring.**

- **The causative agent for scrapie may be present in high concentration in fluids associated with birth and the risk of transmission is considered highest at that time.**

Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

- **Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.**

Isolation on Returning Home

- **The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin.**

Individual Species Requirements

Horses

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is not required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses.**
- **Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record. The test must have been conducted during the current or previous calendar years for New York origin horses. For imported horses, the test must be conducted within 12 months of entry.**
- **The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the horse.**
- **Current rabies vaccination is required for all horses 105 days of age or older (see-above)**

Cattle

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**
- **Current rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 105 days of age or older (see above).**
- **All cattle must be must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above.) The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.**
- **All cattle must be currently vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for theses diseases for the duration of-the-fair.**

Sheep

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a USDA approved flock tattoo or 3) electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program (owner must supply a working electronic reader).**

For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.

- **Current rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 105 days of age or older (see above).**
- **The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.**
- **If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.**

Goats

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo with official registration paper accompanying the animal or 3) a USDA approved herd tattoo or 4) electronic ID if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic ID is recorded on the goats registration paper (owner must supply a working electronic reader).**

For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.

- **The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.**
- **If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.**

Swine

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**

Llamas, Alpacas, Guanacos and Vicunas (New world camelids)

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**
- **All llamas, etc. must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above.) The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.**

Poultry

- **Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition OR 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid lean flock or equivalent flock.**

Deer (Cervidae)

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**
- **Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.**
- **A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD and TB program requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3971.**

Miscellaneous Ruminants / Camels

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**

Elephants

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**
- **All elephants presented for admission to a fair must be exhibited pursuant to a current USDA license.**

Non-human Primates

- **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.**
- Proof of a negative tuberculosis test performed within 12 months of admission.**

INTERSTATE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIR ANIMALS

This document is a supplement to the Animal Health Requirements published for animals exhibited at New York State county fairs and the State Fair. Its purpose is to summarize the import requirements that must be met for livestock entering New York destined for fairs. Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination in species not required by the state. Contact the specific fair for their requirements. Further assistance can be obtained by contacting the Division of Animal Industry (DAI) at 518-457-3502 or your State Veterinarian's office.

CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI)

A CVI is required for all animals moving interstate. Note that interstate CVI's must be issued by an accredited veterinarian and countersigned by the State Veterinarian in the state of origin. The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season, from July 1 through Labor Day, Interstate CVI's can be used multiple times as long as the initial entrance to a fair in NY is within 30 days of issuance and the CVI is initialed by a state official. All documentation must accompany the animals. Animals not meeting the interstate and/or fair requirements will not be allowed on the grounds. Individual ID is required on all animals. Animals with incomplete or illegible ID will be rejected. Where rabies vaccination is required, the information can be included on the health certificate.

HORSES

Horses 6 months of age or older must test negative for equine infectious anemia. The test must be conducted within 12 months of the day of entry. The horse must be clearly and completely identified. Rabies vaccination is required for all horses over 105 days of age.

CATTLE

Cattle from the neighboring states of New England, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. For information on other states, please contact DAI at 518-457-3971. Vaccination for rabies and the bovine respiratory disease complex is required. Cattle from all states must be test negative for BVD-PI with results noted on the CVI.

SHEEP

Sheep can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. All sheep must be identified by a USDA approved tag, a USDA approved flock tattoo, or electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program. The veterinary statement concerning the flock inspection is required. Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep over 105 days of age.

GOATS

Goats can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. The veterinary statement concerning the flock inspection is required. All goats must be identified by a USDA approved tag, legible registration tattoo (with registration papers), a USDA approved herd tattoo, or electronic ID if enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program.

SWINE

Swine can enter with CVI only. No tests are required with the exception of swine from Texas which must have a negative brucellosis test.

LLAMAS / ALPACAS / GUANACOS / VICUNAS (NEW WORLD CAMELIDS)

New world camelids attending a New York county or state fair must be accompanied by a CVI with animals individually identified. They must be test negative for BVD-PI with results noted on the CVI.

DEER (CERVIDAE)

Deer must meet the Federal interstate requirements for tuberculosis testing (be from an accredited or qualified herd). Brucellosis testing is required for deer greater than six months of age. A written permit issued by the Division of Animal Industry is required in advance. For complete information, please contact the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3971.

BIRDS

Out of state poultry must be accompanied by the NPIP flock certificate if the flock is NPIP certified. Otherwise a CVI is required. Poultry, with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl, must test negative for pullorum within 30 days of importation if not from an NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock. Other birds must be accompanied by a CVI. For more information, contact DAI at 518-457-3971.

MONKEYS

CVI plus negative TB test within 12 months of exhibition is required.

ELEPHANTS

CVI plus evidence of current USDA Exhibitor's License.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors who make entries prior to the opening day of the fair receive prompt attention when delivering their exhibits to the appropriate department. By placing the entry tag on the proper article ahead of time, those in charge can direct exhibitors to the proper division.

1. All entries in all departments must be in the Fair Office two days before the first day of the fair along with all fees. All checks or money orders made payable to the Liv. Co. Agric. Soc. & Fair at Caledonia Inc. Once entries are made there will be no substitutions or changes. This rule will be strictly enforced. Please check each department for any deviation of the above rules.
2. An entry fee of 10% of the first premium will be charged in all departments except 4H Club, Junior Fair, and School Art where no entry fee is imposed. In addition to these entry fees, each exhibitor must purchase a membership or exhibitor ticket, except the 4H Club, Juniors, School Art, and F.F.A. All Entry Fees must accompany entries.
3. Exhibitors may purchase an \$8 pass for the week, which does not include rides or a \$30 weekly pass which includes the rides. If you choose not to purchase either of the above, you may enter your exhibits without paying at the gate all day Monday or before 10 a.m. Tuesday. You may pick up your exhibits after 9 p.m. Saturday night or Sunday. Positively no admission at the gate without a ticket.
4. All livestock must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor and must have been owned by him at least 30 days preceding the opening day. All such exhibits must be on the grounds before noon on Tuesday. Opening day exhibits not then in place may be excluded from competition for premiums at the option of the Executive Committee. All exhibits will be released at 9 p.m. the last day of the fair or Sunday. None are to be released earlier without the written consent of the President of the fair. Any exhibitor violating this last provision will thereby forfeit all premiums awarded on the exhibits prematurely removed. The money so forfeited will be retained by the Society and not rewarded to others.
5. This Society assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage to stock or other exhibits from any cause, and upon this condition only are entries received. The Society does not assume any liability for personal injuries or accidents from any cause whatsoever.
6. All protests must be in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the president or Secretary within six hours after the event or award with a deposit of \$10.
7. The Board of Directors reserves the right to alter or eliminate any program or activities of the day.
8. Entries must be made in the name of the actual grower, producers or owners. Exhibitors are required to make themselves acquainted with the prize list and regulations and be sure in what sections and departments their entries belong.
9. The ages of all animals must be given and satisfactory evidence furnished if required. To determine in what division the animal is entered, ages will be computed as stated in the rules of the departments.
10. All premium cards and ribbons must be displayed during the exhibition. No person can make any change or withdraw any article entered for competition or exhibition after having once entered it. This rule will be rigidly enforced in all departments, positively no new classes opened.
11. Superintendents and staff camp free, everyone else pays to camp.
12. No animals can be unloaded until they are inspected by the vet and the superintendents are present.
13. A special Senior subdivision of this department is available for all exhibitors over age 65 who wish to compete. Entry in this Senior Division is to be denoted by writing "Senior" in Division area on tags and prefixing the class entry with a letter "S" on entry forms.

Animals may not be brought in until Monday

Prospective exhibitors of livestock will please take notice that the number of entries accepted will be limited to the capacity of our sheds, and the Society reserves the right to accept or reject entries as may be needed to insure a complete show without overtaxing our permanent exhibition space. All exhibitors will be expected to observe the 30-day ownership rule and should be prepared to furnish an affidavit of ship on request of the judge.

JUDGES

The following standard has been established by the commissioner of Agriculture and Markets, governing awards or premiums:

- No premium should be awarded by any judge or paid by any society for an unworthy exhibit. All judges are expected and directed to adhere strictly to this standard.
- As far as possible the single judge system will rule and great care will be taken to select only those who are qualified.
- Judges will receive their books from the office and when the award is completed, the books must be returned to the office at once. For time of judging, see rules of the respective departments.
- Articles where the entry card is not attached must not be considered.
- No person or persons will be allowed to interfere with the judges in the discharge of their duties. Persons wishing to explain in regard to their exhibits can do so through the Superintendent of that department.
- When the judges have reason to doubt the pedigree of any animal or the representations made of an article, they must report at once to the Superintendent of that department who will gather such evidence as he can at the Secretary's office or by other methods.
- The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistakes, frauds or misrepresentations are shown. In such cases the Directors or such referee as the Directors may select, shall decide.

From New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets:
FortuneTellers: No fortune telling will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Fortune telling, according to McKinney's Consolidated Laws of New York, Section 165.35 of the Penal Law, is a Class B Misdemeanor which can be punishable up to a term not to exceed three months; a fine not to exceed \$500, or both.

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES AND CLERKS

1. Each exhibitor's number represents an entry. A tag bearing the same number is attached to the article entered.
2. In awarding each premium, there should be as many articles, or animals, to pass upon, as there are exhibitor's numbers written after it. If there are four numbers following a premium, as 18, 72, 95 and 136, there are four entries, and the tags on the articles will be numbered, respectively, 18, 72, j95 and 136.
3. Where entries are not found, mark the number X.
4. It is best, before making awards to examine all the entry numbers, and find all of the articles that have been entered for that premium, by comparing the exhibitors numbers entered with those on the tags, checking each number in the book as the entry is found. In this manner the different articles will be grouped and their relative merit will be better disclosed. In case any entry is not found, the fact that it is missing should be well established before it is abandoned.
5. It is best to go through with the list by taking the premiums in regular order. Skipping about involves the probability of overlooking some of them.
6. If you find an apparent error in the entries, or on the tags attached to any articles, unless forbidden by the rules, rather than ignore it and thus injure some exhibitor you had better call the attention of the entry clerk, or owner, to the mistake, and have the correction made before making the award.
7. When you have agreed upon an award enter the winning exhibitor's number opposite the premium won in column headed "Winners Number."
8. This list is for the double purpose of finding the articles to be judged, and to make a proper record and return of the awards made. Record should be made fully and accurately, as the society must Follow it in the payment of the premiums. The Clerk should be qualified by penmanship, etc. to do such writing as is required in making the report of the awards.
9. If our No. 163 sealed entry tags showing exhibitor's name and address are used, the seal may be broken and the name of the exhibitor exposed to the public after judging is completed.
10. When the work is finished, the names of the judge and clerk should be signed on spaces provided below, and list returned at once to the secretary.

7. Use of plant material on the NYS Conservation List is prohibited. No native NYS ferns may be used.
8. The Horticulture Superintendent and the Fair Association will exercise all possible care, but cannot be responsible for breakage or loss.
9. A special Junior subdivision of this department is available for all exhibitors under age 18, who wish to compete. Entry in this Junior Division is to be denoted by writing “Junior” in Division area on tags and prefixing the class entry with a letter “J” on entry forms.

Judging:

1. Judging for Section 1, Potted Plants, and Section 3, Vegetables and Herbs will be on Tuesday.
2. Judging for Section 2, Cut Perennials and Annuals, and Section 4, Floral Design will be on Thursday.

1. Entries are limited to the counties of Livingston, Genesee, Monroe and Wyoming.
2. Read rules carefully before making entries and use entry blank furnished herewith.
3. Entries must be in place between 6-8pm the day prior to the Fair.
4. No exhibitor may make more than one entry in a class, consequently no exhibitor can be awarded more than one premium in a class.
5. Entries in this Department must be made by amateur individuals or an amateur group. One exhibitor ticket will be issued to each group, transferable to any of its members.
6. Amateur status does not include items, or portions of items, a person has been paid to make. If any such entry is received and inadvertently entered in the Judge's book, the article will nevertheless be excluded from competition.
7. Articles shown in this department must be entirely the handiwork of the exhibitor and must have been made within the past two years. NO articles previously exhibited at this Fair will knowingly be accepted for entry. If any such entry is received and inadvertently entered in the Judge's book, the article will nevertheless be excluded from competition.
8. Alteration of any article previously exhibited, either by addition thereto or otherwise, shall not be deemed to make it a NEW article for purpose of entry. All articles, any portion of which had been shown before at this Fair, will be regarded as OLD, within the meaning of Rule 7 above.
9. The Superintendent of this department will be the sole arbiter as to entries made in violation of the rules, and their decisions shall be final.
10. Mexican, Philippine, and French convent work cannot compete with domestic needlework and will not be accepted for entry.
11. Articles may be covered with plastic, but covered so that Judges can inspect.
12. Articles may be refolded, re-hung, etc., for display. If you don't want this done to your articles please indicate this on the tag.
13. An entry is one example of each class unless indicated otherwise.
14. A special Junior subdivision of this department is available for all exhibitors under age 18, who wish to compete. Entry in this Junior Division is to be denoted by writing "Junior" and age in Division area on tags, and prefixing the class entry with a letter "J" on entry forms.

Section II: Commercial Exhibitors

1. Concessionaires of every nature shall make application with the Fair office and will be required to sign a written contract and make a monetary deposit. Before being allowed to transact any business on the Fairgrounds he/she must furnish the Society with a Liability Certificate of Insurance hold proof of Workman's Compensation, if required; also vendors must be registered with the NYS Sales Tax Dept., furnish the Fair Office with his/her Registration number and display their "Original Certificate of Authority" at his or her booth during the entire length of the Fair.
2. The Management reserves the right to cancel at any time, for reasons satisfactory to it, all contracts made with concessionaires or others.
3. Only such privileges are granted for concessions and attractions as are required to supply the wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience and pleasure, but the Management will not accept or knowingly allow the continuance of any concession, show or attraction of a questionable nature, nor will any privilege be permitted where the business is conducted in other than a legitimate and trade-like manner.
4. Concessionaires must abide by the laws of the State, County, Town and the rules of the Fair Board of Managers (the conditions under which the concession was granted). Anyone found violating these laws will be closed, will forfeit his concession money paid, and will be ordered from the fairgrounds.
5. Concessionaire must confine himself to the space assigned him. No Concessionaire or Exhibitor will be permitted to sublet or share any portion of the space allotted to him. A violation of this rule will result in the original purchaser of space forfeiting all his rights, ejection of himself, partners, employees and wares from the grounds.
6. All drinking and eating concessions must furnish themselves with proper and sanitary equipment that will comply with the rules and regulations of the State Health Department. This rule will be strictly enforced.
7. Concessionaires must keep their spaces in a neat and sanitary condition removing there from any filth or refuse and placing the same in garbage cans. All garbage must be placed in trash bags ready for collection.
8. Commercial exhibitors shall not give away items which concessionaires purchase rights and space to sell.
9. Sale or distribution of any merchandise, including printed or written material, except under contract issued by the Society and/or from a contracted space shall be prohibited.
10. Deliverymen, solicitors, concessionaires, and commercial exhibitors will not be permitted to leave their automobiles, trucks or conveyances in such a position as to cause congestion or in fire lanes.
11. All Commercial Exhibits are to be in place by 1 p.m. on Tuesday and remain in place until 9 p.m. on Saturday, unless excused earlier by the President. All buildings with commercial exhibits will open at 10 a.m. and close at about 10 p.m. depending on crowd.
12. The Management assumes no responsibility in case of damage, loss or injury to person or property caused by reason of neglect or willful acts of any person, firm, or their agents, representatives, servants or employees, or from any cause whatsoever, having license to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying space thereon, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said Fair Management. The Fair Society will not be liable for any debt incurred by a concessionaire or exhibitor or any salary or expenses due any of their employees. Neither shall it be responsible for the result of any accident or damage to any person or persons, to any animal, or to property from any cause whatsoever.
13. The Management reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any person or persons whom they deem undesirable, or expel from the grounds such person or persons who shall violate any part of these rules.
14. All concessionaires must remain for the duration of the Fair.

HISTORY

LIVINGSTON COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY & FAIR AT CALEDONIA INC.

According to Frederick F. Keith: "The first mention of Caledonia Fair was in 1833 and then no records of a fair until 1858, 1859 and 1860. The Civil War intervened until a penny postcard mentions 'People's Fair' in 1881 with a half-mile race tract held on the Sinclair Farm south of Black Street. A premium list was issued for the 'First Annual Agricultural Fair & Livestock Show' on September 24 & 25, 1914, spearheaded by the Caledonia Grange #870. In 1915 the name 'Tri-County Fair' was adopted."

According to A.B. Johnson (historian) "in 1916 an organization was formed and chartered as one of the NYS County Fairs and named 'Caledonia Tri-County Fair,' because at this point three counties join -- Livingston, Monroe, and Genesee -- and suitable grounds were purchased on Leicester Road (24 acres with more added later), a stock company formed, grandstand and half-mile race track built, grounds and buildings lighted by electricity and horse barns, cattle, sheep & hog pens built plus erection of Woman's Work & Floral Hall and a Junior Project Building."

From its earliest beginnings the fair in Caledonia appeared to revolve around agriculture - farm products and animals were exhibited. What the grange saw was a permanent fair expanding from small Grange exhibits and growing around the agricultural industry.

Our #1 priority is exposing, educating & expanding public knowledge on the importance of agriculture in our community, county and surrounding counties. Agriculture being the #1 industry in our state, the general public should be made aware of its importance. We fulfill part of that responsibility by providing a show place and demonstration area. Organizations that have participated over the years are 4-H, FFA, Grange, farmers, equipment dealers, and other merchants that buy and sell products for agricultural use and production. Larger equipment and more technology means we are moving from individual small farms to major corporations and we encourage their involvement.

4-H is youth oriented. We provide an opportunity for 4-H participants to show their knowledge and accomplishments of their activities during the year. Events held over the years have been dress revues, meat auctions, talent shows, cooking demonstrations, livestock shows, dog shows, animal judging, etc.

Future Farmers of America (FFA) are young farmers developing their talents for the industry and they have demonstrated these talents at the Caledonia Fair which have included cattle raising, equipment operation, farm safety, production of techniques, crop development, pest control and have demonstrated their responsibility to the environment and eco-system.

Grange gets the community interacting, involved, and supportive of agriculture and provides a friendly family atmosphere for the interaction and education of the community. We provide the show place for their demonstrations and competitions.

Equipment dealers present their products to demonstrate their efficiency and technology to increase productivity. Other merchants have included grain dealers, seed dealers, soil assessment, manure storage, fertilizers, and the latest herbicides and pesticides.

Our #2 priority is to create and maintain an atmosphere for relaxation and enjoyment of the entire family through promotion of different activities. These have included harness racing, draft horse show, horse pulls, petting zoos, ostrich races, rodeos, pony races, milking competitions, Mounted Sheriffs' demonstrations and contests, band competitions, firemen's parades and competitions, tug-of-war contests, Kids' Day competitions, Senior Citizens day, talent shows, pie & cake contests, bull-riding, mutton-riding, Niagara Mohawk Live Line Demonstration, NYS Police demonstrations, Firemen's Safe House (teaching fire safety to kids), midway, truck and tractor pulls, demolition derbies, thrill shows, car races, and farm stock pulls.
